## Shabbona Village Stealing This Man's Property

The Village of Shabbona, along with most of the surrounding villages, has seen a decline in local business; supermarkets, stores, restaurants, barbershops and more used to call Shabbona home. I took a walk down Comanche Ave (US-30) starting at Screamer's and ending at the Self Storage facility and counted the number of active businesses and vacant storefronts. In total, Shabbona is home to around 15 active businesses and around 13 vacancies, that's nearly half of all storefronts sitting empty.

COVID lock-downs and retiring business owners are all factors leading to the closing of businesses but why aren't new businesses stepping in?

The Village President along with some members of the Village Board have been actively targeting business owners and dissuading prospective businesses, driving both new and existing businesses out. According to many sources, there have been at least three new businesses who tried to open up shop in town until they were confronted by the village government.

With some of the backstory out of the way, let's now introduce the story of the man who's property is under threat of being stolen by the Village, Barry Greenwell.

Barry owns the property located at  $106\frac{1}{2}$  W Comanche Ave which has been home to a small engine repair shop for XXX years. They repair almost anything powered by a small engine, including lawn mowers, snow blowers, generators, etc. Barry has also expressed interest in expanding the services to include sharpening of blades and knives. But his property has been targeted by the Village President and members of the Village Board who are trying to bully him and several other property owners into selling or demolishing their buildings.

The village has been discriminating against Barry by passing ordinances that seem to be selectively aimed at him. Barry has been doing everything in his power to comply with the new ordinances and has done extensive work to fix up the building. Now the Village is trying to use the "Vacant Buildings" ordinance that was passed in March 2023 to impose heavy fines and registration requirements for his occupied and legal buildings. The Village has ordained that his buildings are vacant despite the fact that his business is still open.

The Village is trying to impose fines and ultimately liens to force a sale of his property because certain members of the village government want to include portions of his land to make way for a very small park. There have also been talks about using it to expand a proposed parking lot scheduled to be built in early to mid 2024. Regardless of why they want the land, the Village is overreaching their authority and infringing on the rights of several residents and I believe it is our duty as citizens to stand up against this tyranny.

Please let your voice be heard by calling all members of the Village Board and the Village President to let them know they will not be allowed to steal people's property and about any concerns you may have about them pushing prospective businesses out of town.

### Winter Maintenance Tips by Up Realty

- Garden hoses should be removed from any water spigots, drained, and put away.
   This is one of the most common causes of damage.
- If a pipe freezes, it's best to turn off your water supply to the entire house and try to thaw it before turning the water back on. This way if the pipe did burst, you can quickly shut it off again to minimize damage.
- Check if your spigot has a water shutoff valve inside the home. Turning it off and keeping the faucet open to let the water out is another great way to prevent ice damage.
- On particularly cold days opening cabinets in bathrooms and kitchens where sinks are can help make sure your home's heat can reach your pipes.
- Check your furnace filter and replace every 3 months or if it looks dirty. This not only helps your furnace last longer it helps keep your indoor air cleaner. Consider getting a tune-up or inspection by a HVAC company.
- Test your sump pump. Pour water into your pit until it turns on. Also consult with your owner's manual on any maintenance it may require. Melting snow is a prime time for water to intrude on basements.
- Clear out your gutters. Leaves and debris can cause water runoff to get trapped and freeze causing ice dams and water leaking into your home.
- Try changing your ceiling fan's direction to clockwise to bring warmer air in your ceiling down and run it at it's slowest speed.

When kids today are given the same task, they tend to draw pictures of what appears to be a Gothamesque dystopia, a dark, dingy, future where the poor are packed like sardines into cramped living quarters, where social interaction has gone by the wayside in favor of the metaverse, and where everyone and everything is under constant surveillance by governmental and corporate overlords.

But why? Things used to be better, right? Or is the nostalgia for childhood which we all share deceiving us into believing that things must be worse today, since they must have been great when we were kids?



We'd see a movie at the theater, grab some ice cream at the ice cream parlor.... Our parents all knew one another, and we felt like we lived in a real community. Now, the proverbial movie theater has been demolished, and the ice cream parlor was boarded up 20 years ago.

Weren't there more things to do when we were kids? What do the kids do these days? The answer to that question is a sad one: nothing. Kids these days, by and large, are growing up atomized, away from other people, and sans anything that could be called a community. This past Halloween season, I saw someone on social media lamenting, "Where are all the Trick-or-Treaters?!" I'm sure this person is not alone in feeling this way: Why, when I was a kid, this was a whole event! The whole neighborhood came out to Trick-or-Treat!

Where are the trick-or-treaters? Where are the movie goers and the ice cream shop customers? Where are the community?

There's an underappreciated and unique aspect to all of these things. Trick-or-treat is an event by and for young people. The primary customer base of a movie theater, and ice cream shop, and, by golly, just about every local business you can think of, is young people. This issue isn't exclusive to rural communities and small towns either; the suburbs have an equal problem. Where have all the malls gone? Perhaps a better question is: where has their customer base gone? Where are all the young people?

The answer to that question, dear reader, is that they don't exist.
